Dear Secretary Castro:

On June 7, 2012, sixty-nine Members of the House of Representatives sent a letter asking HUD Secretary Donovan to revise the existing FHA condo rules so that "FHA can better serve this important sector of the housing market." In September 2012, HUD published temporary guidance implementing minor provisions and promised more robust changes. Unfortunately, these temporary changes have not increased access to FHA loans for condominium purchases. Additional policy changes are necessary to protect the viability of the condo market.

FHA places significant restrictions on the purchase and sale of condominiums, even though they are often the most affordable homeownership option for first-time buyers, small families, urban and older Americans. Condos also offer residents access to the amenities, services, and public transportation that can build stronger communities and promote sustainable homeownership.

The FHA certification process can be daunting, especially for smaller properties and those without professional management. It takes significant time and resources to collect the required information and provide the necessary paperwork to become certified, and this must be done every two years. Based on HUD's own data, only 20 percent of condominiums that have previously been approved for FHA financing are currently approved, and it is estimated that this is less than 10 percent of the overall condomarket.

In addition to the certification process, the FHA's required owner-occupancy ratio is often difficult to meet. The ratio requirement can actually result in an increased number of leased units because owners who need to sell are forced to rent if their buildings are not FHA certified. In comparison, the GSEs have no owner-occupancy requirements for condo properties. Mixed use and commercial space within the buildings also continue to be another problem. Although FHA's temporary rules allow exceptions for buildings with commercial space, few, if any, of these buildings have been approved.

Continued enhancements to FHA's condominium rules will ensure that condominium associations become more stable, that homeowners will be able to sell their units and homebuyers will have more opportunities to buy affordable properties. The undersigned urge you to remove these barriers to homeownership and allow condominiums to remain an affordable option for American families.
